

<u>Teaching Unions Strike Action:</u> You may be aware from media coverage that the National Education Union (NEU) have declared strike action, which will take place in our region on the following days:

- 1<sup>st</sup> February,
- 28<sup>th</sup> February,
- 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> March.

I'm writing to you all to give you as much notice as possible that learning may be disrupted on these dates and there may be a partial closure of the school. The strikes are happening because of a national dispute between the unions and the government over teachers' pay and conditions, and not because of any issues at our school.

As many of our school staff are NEU members there is a strong chance that we may be affected by this action. At present, we are unable to offer final details on the provision we will be able to offer on these days but would hope to make you fully aware of this at least one week prior to each scheduled strike day.

However, I do recommend that you start to consider alternative childcare arrangements for these dates. I'm sorry about the potential disruption to you and to your child's education. I understand that this situation may be frustrating, and ask that all members of our school community continue to treat each other with respect.

School leaders across our Trust are reviewing the latest DfE guidance on responding to strikes and are liaising with HR advisers, union representatives and our staff team to keep up to date with the situation.

In line with Department for Education guidance, the decision to open, restrict attendance, or close the setting will be based upon our ability to ensure that staffing within school is of a sufficient level to ensure pupils are not exposed to risks to their health and safety.

The Department for Education guidance also tells us that:

'If the numbers of staff on strike means a school must temporarily prioritise places they should, where possible, give priority to vulnerable children and young people and children of critical workers.'

With this in mind, national guidance on 'critical worker' status can be found within Annex B of the following document

We regret that we are unable to give any further firm details of provision to be offered on these dates but the nature of industrial action such as strikes does bring with it an element of unpredictability. Further details will follow as soon as possible.
