



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Key Knowledge

- A website is a collection of pages, under one name
- Routers enable messages to be passed between networks via switches
- Keeping a network safe is the same as making sure you lock your front door
- Networks have security features to block or allow messages or requests
- The internet is connected by lots of routers.
- The World Wide Web is part of the internet where we can visit web pages and websites.
- websites and their contents are made up of files and you can add your own content in some cases
- Different people own different content on the internet
- You should not believe everything you read on the internet
